
After this, Vivian, from Grade 11, completed by telling us some other benefits: "I think it's important

# The First Offshore School in Brazil: Canadian School of Niteroi

The Canadian School of Niterói is the first and only offshore school in Brazil. This school teaches the students to work in groups, do volunteer work and learn different languages, such as English and French. Most of the students in the Canadian school want to apply international universities , and it is so much easier to enter in an international college if you are a Canadian student because they are already used with the approach of the education from Canada, and they receive a final high school degree not just from Brazil, but from Canada too.

In the beginning of April, the school received the visit of Mr. Richard Demmings and Ms. Beverley Loker French, who are representatives from the Atlantic Education International (AEI), and to evaluate the school. During the evaluation the Canadians classes participated in activities from toddler to high school, engaged in meetings and interacting with students and teachers.



The school is not only authorized to operate as offshore Canadian school, but it also gained the title of high performing school, which is a true model of high performance. After gaining this title school will just need another evaluation in five years. achievement is a n effort. everyone in the school, teachers, employees and students.



scrolling through the After official Canadian School's instagram it is possible to see that 38,5% of the students are accepted in broad colleges like University of New Brunswick, Florida International University, St.Thomas University and Instituto Marangoni. One example is our former student Barbara Muniz that entered the University of New Brunswick in 2023. She is studying software engineering and is enjoying her college



experience very much . This is a result of all the hard work, not only of the students, but the wonderful education that the school offers and the support the teachers give to each of their students.

Another great factor about the school is its offshore title. Offshore means "coming from other territories", which applies directly to our school methodology. The students received the same education as Canadians, such as the same subjects like Pre-Calculus, World Issues, Journalism and Nutrition. Furthermore, the teachers are not only focused at teaching students school content, but in everyday classe, the students learn how to be a better person and live in society.





## Help Rio Grande do Sul Campaign: What is it and how can you help?

With the recent floods and nature problems in Rio Grande do Sul, our school created a campaign to help affected people from all the problems caused by the rains.

The Brazilian state, Rio Grande Sul. is going through delicate period in its history, and suffered enormous floods that created problems in over 420 cities in the state, hence affected the lives of more than million people, with deaths recorded. Aware of the situation, many organizations, businesses, and schools created including fundraisers Canadian School of Niterói. to help those people.

The students João Taveira, Olivhia and Aline of Grade 11 are organizing a campaign to help the people affected by the floods in RS, focusing on the donations of water, non-perishable foods like and objects mattresses. clothes. blankets. and donations will be accepted by 05/09/2024 and distributed in the receptions of both campuses of Itacoatiana and Piratininga, and then, will be delivered to the Galeão air force.

Our school is not the only participant of the campaign, other courses like PB from Icaraí, Piratininga and Tijuca are also included, aside from the

schools Marília Mattoso and Marilia Mattoso II. This attitude is one of the best examples of empathy that our school has ever commited. Helping those who are in need in Rio Grande do Sul is crucial for our country right now. It is a very fragile situation that the state is going by. 




Have you ever tought about bringing food from home?




Do you miss healthy options?






Have you ever waited more than 10 minutes to get food?

In order to learn more about that position, an interview with Miss Juliana Albuquerque, a journalist who works at the Canadian School of Niterói, took place. In this interview she told us all about what it is like being a journalist.

Ms Juliana went to a university in Brazil and did a multimedia course as well. Brazil has big social issues, and with this job she thought that she could do something about it. Also her biggest motivation to become a journalist was her will to show the world the issues that are happening on our planet, by that, helping to overcome the problems that occur around us. According to her, "Journalists have a big responsibility and I wanted to show the world its own social issues". She completed by saying that journalism was able to show her all different kinds of realities, and that has improved her professional and personal life. Juliana once was asked to write a research paper about Duque de Caxias and their population. situation in the city.

When she arrived there, she came across a situation completely different from her own reality. She experienced how people lived there and was now truly aware of their inconvenient Juliana described that memory as one of her favorites, for personal and professional reasons, as she was able to learn a lot from it, "With my job, you can be in and you can see situations that you would not if you weren't a journalist". She also stated that she always wanted to be a journalist and that when she got out of school and took journalism in college, she also did an additional course on media and only after that she entered the job market and started working.
